# School News



### More Academic Success For CHS

Last year was another strong year for academic results at the School. GCSE students achieved nearly 70% A\* and A grades and 90% of candidates gained at least a B grade. Among this impressive set of results were 21 individuals who gained at least nine A\* grades.

At A Level, our newest Old Waconians, the Class of 2016, performed equally well, with 78% of results gaining A\*-B. Seventeen students gained at least two A\* grades, while five students - Owen Ballantine, Jack Boyd, Hal Dewhurst, James Hartley and Rebecca Prince - were awarded 3 A\* grades.

Graduates from the Class of 2016 are now off to a host of exciting destinations including the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge, London School of Economics and New York University.

#### Liberty and Liberties At The Head's Lecture

In November we welcomed Shadow Attorney General, Baroness Shami Chakrabarti CBE to give the 2016 Head's Lecture.

Shami spoke to a packed audience about her journey from Director of Liberty into politics and answered questions from the floor about being brave, equality for women and life post Brexit and Trump.

Before the lecture she spent an hour with 14 Sixth Form students. They discussed a range of topics from social media and privacy to the current refugee crisis.

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There was always a party atmosphere at the end with Miss Kight preparing sausages and beans at the finish. The amounts raised soon rose to £2,000 a year; probably about 10 times that in today's money.

Jim has been awarded The Legion of Honour for his participation in World War II. This is the highest order in France for excellent civil or military conduct, and makes Jim a Chevalier (Knight) of the Légion d'honneur.



# Lord Alf Dubs

Class of 1951

Distinguished Old Waconian Award 2012 recipient, Lord Dubs has been recognised for his efforts to secure asylum for modern child refugees.

He was awarded 'Peer of the Year' at the Spectator's Parliamentarian of the Year Awards in November for his successful amendment to the Immigration Act, which allowed unaccompanied children to gain refuge in the UK.

Moved by his own experiences on the kindertransport during World War II, Lord Dubs's intervention has been widely praised by the public and politicians alike.



#### Terry Robson Class of 1960

Congratulations to Terry who, this year, accomplished the personal milestone of completing a million metres of swimming – a challenge he was given by the Coach of the Masters Swimming Club in Adelaide.

Terry's previous sporting achievements include cycling from Land's End to John O'Groats and running 100 separate marathons.


Class of 2009



# Old Waconian Awards 2016

The School recognises extraordinary alumni who have gone beyond the call of duty, progressed and excelled in their field or made an outstanding contribution in their chosen career.

This year we celebrate the achievements of not just two, but nine former CHS students who have truly inspired the School community - an individual whose 40-year career in public health has had a huge impact on the lives of women across the world, and a group who found strength after the death of their friend by continuing his incredible fundraising legacy.

#### Distinguished Old Waconian Award Dr Olayinka Koso-Thomas, Class of 1954

Dr Koso-Thomas has spent more than 40 years working in the fields of family planning, general medical practice, birth control and public health. She was recently awarded an Honorary Doctorate by the National Autonomous University of Mexico and the King of Spain presented her with the 'Prince of Asturias Award' for pioneering work on the practice of Female Genital Mutilation (FGM).

Olayinka studied Medicine at the University of Leeds and gained a



Masters in Public Health (specialising in Maternal and Child Health) at Berkeley University in California.

In 1966, she relocated to Sierra Leone where she has spent her professional life dealing with the health consequences of FGM on women and young girls in Africa. In 1997, she published her landmark book, *The Circumcision of Women*. This was the first clear and undiluted exposition on the subject. It set out a programme of action to eliminate the practice over a 20-year period.

Her contribution to the changes in attitude to FGM has been immense; a number of countries in Africa have now instituted laws banning the practice, and the dissemination of information about FGM in Europe and the rest of the world has galvanised support for its eradication worldwide. Laws also now exist in some European countries banning the practice.














#### Old Waconian Weekend

# In The 'Thick Of It'

# Sarah Phillips Class of 2008

From the classrooms of CHS to the corridors of power, Sarah Phillips has taken a passion for politics that started at School and turned it into a highly successful career in Whitehall.

A former aide to Theresa May, Sarah has worked for the Policing Minister on the criminal justice portfolio and advised on security and defence policy in the Foreign Office. She now works as Private Secretary to the current Home Secretary, Amber Rudd.

#### How did your political career start?

After CHS, I studied Politics at Durham University. I knew by the second year that I was never going to be a 'corporate' person -I'm too outspoken! I applied for an internship with the Foreign Office and I was one of only 20 selected. I'd developed an interest in Middle Eastern politics at university and I was learning Arabic so I was given a job on the Libya Desk, which turned into a completely bizarre experience as the Arab Spring was well underway while I was there. I found myself fielding calls from the USA asking if we knew where Gaddafi was, and was fortunate enough to be in post when all that unfolded. It was very exciting to witness history in the making while working on human rights in Libya.

#### After graduating, you were accepted onto the prestigious Civil Service Fast Stream programme. What was that like?

The selection process is pretty tough. Only 20% of applicants are invited to an assessment day, which is like a baptism of fire with timed mock meetings and briefings. I was posted to the Ministry of Justice and started working on a huge probation restructuring project, the biggest reform for the department in the last 100 years. I spent a lot of time in prisons talking to offenders,

which was intimidating at first

- like something out of Porridge

- but also fascinating. Working
with such vulnerable people,
both offenders and victims, was
hard but I like to think we made
a difference to people's lives.

# What's the best job you've had at Westminster?

Last year, I was fortunate enough to go back to my dream department, the Foreign Office, to work on the Strategic Defence and Security Review. Being at the heart of our security and defence policy was, at times, daunting, especially working hand in glove with the military, but having to quickly become an expert in matters of weaponry and warfare was an excellent learning curve.

# How did you end up being Private Secretary to Theresa May?

In April this year, I applied for promotion out of the Fast Stream and took on the role of Private Secretary for immigration and border security to the Home Secretary who, at that time, was Theresa May. I was terrified at the thought of being interviewed by her, but she was so approachable. It was only three months before she became Prime Minister, but I still work with her as an advisor. I'm lucky to be at No.10 quite a bit – it never ceases to be an impressive place to work.

### What's been your most memorable experience so far?

Being right in the thick of -and somehow surviving - the Brexit referendum and observing from the front row the political



pandemonium that ensued afterwards. (Keep an eye out for my memoirs in 20 years time!)

# How did your experience at School help you in your career?

CHS gave me so many opportunities to try different things and find out what interested me. I was involved with Model United Nations (MUN), Think Tank (a political discussion club) and Amnesty International. Through the School I was able to do an internship with Lord Dubs. who I still meet up with on a regular basis. I had never even been to London before but suddenly, there I was in the House of Lords, going to meetings, talking to lobby groups and bumping into lack Straw and Ian Duncan Smith in the corridor! I owe Lord Dubs a lot as that experience made me realise I wanted a career in politics, and gave me the confidence to pursue it. I wouldn't have had that opportunity without CHS and those staff members that supported me throughout (you know who you are!).

# What does your connection to CHS mean to you today?

It means a lot because the School gave me so much. I've been back as the guest speaker at the MUNCH conference which, given that not long ago I was sitting in the hall as a delegate, was an honour. I also mentor two current CHS students, giving them advice on studying Politics at university and how to get into the Civil Service. I feel I should give something back because CHS made me the confident, resilient person I am today.

# Californication and The Future Of Transportation

West coast USA may be known for its relaxed lifestyle, but after an Aeronautics Masters from Massachusetts' Institute of Technology (MIT) led him to Los Angeles, Philippe Kirschen is going places... fast.

# Congratulations on your MIT team's win to build and test a pod for the Hyperloop - can you tell us more about this?

After Elon Musk first proposed the Hyperloop concept for high-speed transportation, (consisting of pods travelling through low pressure tubes), his company, SpaceX, announced a competition to get students involved in the project. A friend and I brought together a 30-strong team at MIT in the summer of 2015 and, after five months, we presented our pod concept at the Design Weekend in Texas. We were thrilled and completely surprised to win first place. Since then, we've been building and testing the pod we designed. It has been a lot of work, but an incredible learning experience.

#### You've now been employed to work on the real Hyperloop in LA full time - what is a typical day like for you?

As Optimization Engineer I get to apply the research I did in graduate school about aircraft design optimisation to the design of a Hyperloop system. I spend my days writing code and talking to people about how best to model the physics and economics of the Hyperloop. Hyperloop One is a special place to

work; I get to contribute to cutting edge technology and my colleagues are smart and kind. Our founders fully embrace start-up culture: we have a casual dress code, a dog-friendly office, free snacks and catered lunches every day, an onsite Barista and a personal trainer who runs daily workouts to keep us all fit. It isn't all fun and games, though. The world is watching and there is a lot of pressure to deliver a product in the face of some serious challenges.

# How do you think CHS helped prepare you for the work you do now?

CHS instilled a strong work ethic in me and gave me many opportunities beyond the classroom. It prepared us well for university applications and, in my case, to US universities. Most importantly, the School helped emphasise the importance of effective communication. You can be the best engineer in the world but useless if you can't write or express yourself clearly. I definitely had a stronger foundation in writing and presentation than my peers, so I'm particularly grateful in that respect.

# What does being an Old Waconian mean to you?

I rarely go a day without remembering something from my CHS days, even if it's just for a second. CHS has the academic rigor and wealth of extracurricular activities to rival the best schools in the country, but without having an elitist or pretentious culture. I'm proud to be associated with such a unique place.

### What do you miss most about the UK?

Besides my friends, I miss the BBC, Worcestershire Sauce crisps, the word crisps, the word whilst, the word maths, proper fish and chips, having a semi-functional train system, playing hockey, classic British understatement, British supermarkets, anglicised Indian food, and not having the word anglicise auto-correct to anglicize. Now I live in Southern California, I'm actually starting to miss rain as well... err... maybe...

# The Taylor Family

The Taylor family's links to Cheadle Hulme School go back more than 100 years, producing four generations of proud Old Waconians - and with Taylor children still coming to the School today, the family tradition looks set to continue for years to come.

The connection began in the early 1900s when Fred Taylor, a wholesale egg merchant, and his wife Violet moved into Fernside, a house in the grounds of the School. They struck up a close friendship with Thomas Lockhart, the long-serving Head Teacher, and Fred and Violet's children, Arthur, Frank, Jack and Barbara, grew up among the hustle and bustle of School life.

Fred's sons went on to become the first Taylors to study at CHS and, later, in the 1940s, five of their children, plus two of Barbara's, also went to the School. Another generation of Taylors followed in the 1970s and the connection continues today with Alex and Archie keeping the connection alive in Years 8 and 10.

Fernside may be long gone but, for the Taylors, CHS will always feel like home.



#### Mike Taylor Class of 1957

After leaving CHS, Mike went to UMIST to study Mechanical Engineering. He became a Chartered Engineer and worked for British Aerospace from 1961 until his retirement in 1995. He is now a naturalist and author of several publications on the flora and fauna of Greece, where he spends eight months of the year, and has a long-standing research partnership with World Museum Liverpool.

"I was at school at the same time as my brother and three of my cousins so there was a bit of a family atmosphere.

One of my most vivid memories is of being the Ink Monitor and having to go down into the cellar under the swimming pool to refill the jug with ink. I enjoyed Music lessons, but mainly because you had a good view of the railway line from the window.

I was delighted when my grandson Alex got a place at CHS and I take a real interest in what he does. It's nice that he's carrying on the family tradition and has all the opportunities that the School can offer.

My year group still meets up every year and I have made regular contributions to the Bursary Fund. My experience at School was so overwhelmingly positive, I want to help other children to have the same opportunities that I had."



#### Sarah "Lou" Pannell (née Taylor) Class of 1985

Mike's niece Lou worked as a speech and language therapist in Leicester and London after leaving university. Lou and her husband, lan, a BBC journalist, have lived in the US, Cairo and New Delhi and are currently based in Washington D.C. The couple have three sons.

"I knew that several members of my family had attended CHS before me and I think that was a big part in the decision for me to go there.

I remember school as a happy time. There always seemed to be an opportunity to find your own passions and there were always plenty of others who shared them. There were so many opportunities offered to you at CHS, it was more than just getting academic qualifications.




#### **Alex Taylor**

# A History Of Lacrosse At CHS

1880s Lacrosse was introduced as a sport at CHS in the early 1880s.

1911 The Manchester Wacoboys Lacrosse Club was formed. In 1927 the Club changed its name to Manchester Waconians. The club still plays regularly

- their Secretary is Alan Boyle, Class of 1969.

1938 The all-conquering 1937–38 School Lacrosse Team

won the Senior Flags, Referee Trophy, Iroquois Cup and the Stockport Cup all in one season!

1948 Seven Old Waconians played in the 1948 London

Olympics. Playing in a demonstration match, the All-England Team was captioned by OW Jack Whitehead.

70s & 80s Lacrosse hit its peak at CHS in the 70s and 80s with

numerous successful teams coached by Vaughan Wilcock.

Many CHS boys played for Cheshire at this time. Pictured is the Cheshire U18 Team in 1982 which featured 4 CHS students; William Redhead, Matthew Savage, Paul Ogden and Howard Inchbold-Stevens.

A select few were even selected to play for England when they left the School including Michael Murphy and the Savage brothers, Matthew and Simon.

1996 Lacrosse ceased to be played as a School sport -

a combination of a shortage of coaching staff and other local school teams made it difficult to continue the sport.

2016 Lacrosse returned to CHS at the recent Old Wac Weekend!

Vaughan Wilcock was an inspiration to many Lacrosse players throughout his time at the School. We are sad to report that Vaughan passed away in February 2016 at a great loss to the Cheadle Hulme School community.

He joined the School in 1975 as a Maths teacher and took an active role in the life of the School, becoming known not only for his Lacrosse coaching but also his dedication to the Columbus Fellowship, Cheadle Hulme Challenge and the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Schemes.

A stalwart of the CHS community - he will be dearly missed.







# Inside Look

CHS can look forward to an exciting season of sport now that the final bricks have been laid for the School's brand new Pavilion.

Over the spring, work began on replacing the 1950s-built Pavilion, which had been outgrown by the School's 21st century teams and young athletes. We were thrilled to welcome Team GB's Hockey Olympic Gold Medallist Susannah Townsend to officially open the new building in early December.

The flagship building for sport at CHS, the Pavilion is part of a wider £3.4 million capital development programme across the whole School site, which also includes a new coach dropoff facility, 3G pitch and a small extension to the Junior School.

Providing improved changing facilities for all teams, a larger multi-sports area and gym, a dedicated space for Junior School sports and a viewing gallery for spectators, the new amenities are set to make a significant impact on the CHS experience.





# Fundraising At CHS

Paul has very personal motives for funding the Bursaries:

"My mother wanted to be a doctor but wasn't permitted to study science subjects at the all-girls school she went to. She had to fight to gain a place at an all-boys school, was the only girl at the school, and subsequently graduated from the University of Manchester as a doctor, together with my father.



"Female engineers, scientists and researchers are one of our biggest untapped resources. The UK is way behind other countries is utilising this opportunity. I want to do all I can to raise the aspirations of young females and give them access to the outstanding education which Cheadle Hulme School provides."

He is a qualified Mediator and specialist Mediation Advocate.

Karim practices mainly in London, the South East and Midlands where he has defended or prosecuted many high profile cases, including prosecuting the Soham murderers (Jan Huntley & Maxine Carr).


His advice and advocacy is sought across the criminal spectrum: including murder, serious fraud, health & safety, drug trafficking and sexual offences. He has a particular interest in medico-legal, science-based, baby-shaking cases and cold-case reviews. He also advises and represents parties in cases concerning foreign jurisdiction/cross-border issues: this has included opposing inter-governmental requests for the extradition of alleged 'gang murderers' convicted abroad in their absence.

His close association with the academics in the University of Cambridge has helped to make him a leading Silk in the cross examination of scientific experts in many fields, including pathology, neuropathology, genetics, palynology (plant based analysis) and mineralogy.

Karim was the keynote speaker at the inaugural conference for Senior Investigating Officers on the electronic presentation of evidence in court. He is a member of the British Academy of Forensic Sciences to whom he presented the keynote speech on "The Science of the Soham Murders".

Karim was awarded Financial Regulation Lawyer of the year in 2015, by Corporate Livewire Magazine.

Karim is married with two adult children. He regularly attends the theatre, opera and ballet and is now a keen cyclist and golfer, having hung up his lacrosse boots due to injury.

# Focus On

# Bronte Law Class of 2013

At 18, Bronte Law left her family and friends to move more than 5,000 miles away, to Los Angeles, to pursue her dream of becoming a professional golfer.



With a prestigious golf scholarship from UCLA, Bronte is now studying for a Sociology degree while moving up the ranks of amateur women's golf and working towards gaining her professional 'tour card'.

A former member of Bramhall Golf Club, Bronte won the 2016 European Ladies' Amateur Championship, and is ranked the World No.2 in the World Amateur Golf Rankings. She ended the season top of the Golfweek/Sagarin Women's Amateur rankings and recently won the ANNIKA Award presented by 3M, which is given annually to the most outstanding female collegiate golfer.

The Old Waconian caught up with Bronte during a rare visit home.

#### When did you first start playing golf?

My dad was a member of a golf club and I first went along with him at about five years old. I've always been very sporty generally – I played football, tennis and hockey for CHS as well as playing golf outside of School – but by the time I was eight I realised I couldn't do everything and I had to make a choice. I chose golf – mainly because there's actually money in it!

#### What made you choose UCLA?

I originally wanted to go to Stamford, because that's where Tiger Woods went and the coach there had been watching me since I was about 12. Unfortunately, she left and I didn't want to go to Stamford without her. I contacted all the other universities with golf scholarships and said I was open to offers! UCLA really impressed me as it's the number one college in the USA for golf, their programme is excellent and they have the most players progressing to the Ladies Professional Golf Association (LPGA) tour.

# Were you scared about moving to LA on your own?

It was daunting but everybody was very welcoming so the transition wasn't too bad. I do miss everyone but, fortunately, it's easy to stay in contact these days. My sister was ten when I left, she's I3 now and changed so much. It's quite hard to be so far away and see her growing up without me but we Skype all the time and speak on social media. My whole family is very supportive of me.

#### What is life like as a golf scholar?

I get to play golf every day which is great, especially as my local club in LA also has Andy Roddick and Liam Neeson as members! If I'm not on the golf course, I'm studying so there isn't much downtime. I'm hoping to go professional next year so I'm currently taking part in a Qualifying School, which is a series of qualifying tournaments for leading golf tours like the LPGA tour. If you're successful you get a 'tour card' that allows you to compete in the tour. There are three stages to get through and it's extremely competitive. Only the top 20 players receive a tour card.

# What's been your biggest achievement to date?

Winning the European Championship this year was a massive achievement because there hasn't been an English winner for 16 years. I was also really proud to be part of the winning Curtis Cup team when GB/Ireland defeated the USA.

# What kind of a student were you at CHS?

I tried hard and did my best. I'm quite a driven person so I knew I had to take it seriously to get the qualifications I needed for a golf scholarship. I owe a lot to the teachers, especially Miss Sharples; she transformed me as a pupil. She really pushed me to achieve – the best teacher ever!

# How do you feel about your connection to the School today?

I'm linked to people all over the world thanks to being at CHS. I still feel part of the School community but also something bigger. I feel like I could talk to other Old Wacs anywhere in the world, which is great because you never know who you might need one day.

#### What's next for you?

I graduate next December and, if I get my tour card, I plan to move to LA permanently and be full time on tour. It's been my dream since I was eight – and I'm so close, it's really exciting!
