James worked with the Trust on SafeSkills, a new primary preventative resource about 'grooming' behaviours, developed in consultation with the NSPCC, Liverpool's 'Protect' team, Merseyside Police and primary school teachers. James provided the voiceover for 'Will', who guides pupils and teachers through the interactive resource which will help young people develop their communication skills, increase their resilience and build a network of people that they can turn to for support. With 85 schools and local authorities from across the country already signed up to use the resource, SafeSkills has the potential to impact on thousands of young people in the UK.

Graduate Rosie Redvers-Jones has developed a business training performers in the Scare and Live Horror entertainment industry, a sector which has grown in popularity in recent years. Rosie spotted a need for specific Scare Actor Training and has now performed with or trained the actors for companies across the UK, including London (Unlocked Vision Entertainment), Norfolk (PrimEvil at Dinosaur Adventure Park), York (HallowScream at York Maze), Birmingham (Twisted Attractions), Penkridge (Twisted Attractions at Lower Drayton Farm) and Canterbury (Contagious at Canterbury Tales). She even has her own event, ScreamFest in Burton-on-Trent, which has entertained audiences of 18,000 people over 14 terrifying nights.



The course enabled me to really get to grips with what I wanted to achieve in training Scare performers. I gained a much deeper understanding of how I could work with, and deliver, the performance system I had created when working in the industry, and I was able to develop that in my Masters.

Exchanging Dances



Inspirational collaboration with Tate Exchange

Tate Exchange is an ambitious open experiment which allows other organisations and the public to participate in a creative process, running events and projects on-site and using art as a way of addressing wider issues in the world around us. As part of this project, final year dancers from Edge Hill University showcased 'Exchanging Dances' in Tate Liverpool, performing three new dances in a cyclical series of choreographies and staged improvisations that explored and celebrated dance as exchange. Taking inspiration from the Tate Exchange 'provocations', the dances included moving exchanges, social networking, touch and interchange. The dancers worked collaboratively to devise complex structures, scores and dance materials, which provoked and offered exchanges between dancers and between dancers and the public.



The Edge Hill dance students really took the idea of Exchange as a live brief to develop their performances. They were extremely professional in their conduct in the gallery and in their interaction with the public. The performances were of a very high standard, evidenced by over 1,000 members of the public being totally engaged.

Students go back to school with Theatr Clwyd

Theatr Clwyd is Wales' major drama producer and home to an acclaimed theatre production company. A new partnership with Theatr Clwyd aims to provide high quality opportunities for Edge Hill Drama students to engage with the theatre, prepare graduates for employment and create concrete opportunities for students to move into the theatre industry. Recently, students have been involved in the company's highly successful schools project, Theatr Clwyd@Elfed, which sees a team of performers, musicians, visual artists and dancers conduct a week long 'street festival' in a secondary school, with events happening between lessons, in corridors and recreational areas throughout the site. Artistic Director of Theatre Clwyd, Tamara Harvey, will also visit third year acting and directing students to talk to them about her work and the work of the theatre.



The aim of the partnership is to enhance employment opportunities for students and recent graduates, and enlarge the pool of properly prepared graduates and emerging artists available to creative organisations.

Dance for Parkinsons



Pioneering partnership with English National Ballet

Edge Hill works with English National Ballet (ENB) and Merseyside Dance Initiative (MDI) providing volunteers to assist with its Dance for Parkinson's programme. Classes for people with Parkinson's disease and their families are delivered in London, as well as nationally in collaboration with regional hub partners National Dance Company Wales based in Cardiff, DanceEast in Ipswich, MDI in Liverpool and Oxford City Council. Since 2014, dance artist and Edge Hill Associate Lecturer, Helen Gould, supported by student volunteers, has taught the Liverpool programme, providing a fun and informal way for participants to discover the themes, choreography and music of the ballets.


The programme is proven to support people with Parkinson's to develop confidence and strength, while temporarily relieving some participants of symptoms in everyday life.

Edge Hill alumni and current students have worked with LPM Dance Theatre and Zemap Film Productions on an exciting collaborative dance project. Dance graduates, Malachi Simmons and Jamie Pickles, and current students Bethan Jones and Rocky Serg Widdowson, worked in partnership with theatre professionals and students from Albany Academy to develop a live performance and dance film as part of Astley Illuminated, a community arts event at historic Astley Hall in Lancashire. More than 2,000 people watched the collaboration, which consisted of three historic and contemporary dance pieces imagining the marriages of two 17th and 19th century couples at the Hall.

Getting inside the outdoor arts industry with Walk the Plank

Walk The Plank (WTP) is one of the UK's leading outdoor arts organisations, with more than two decades' experience of producing high-quality, internationally-significant events that are seen by millions of people across the globe. A long-term partnership between WTP and Edge Hill University included the development of Sowing Seeds, a live processional piece at Burscough community farm, which encompassed mass movement, music and puppetry. Edge Hill students were trained in outdoor/participation arts practice by experienced lead artists from WTP, while graduate mentees worked in key directorial and production roles. The partnership with WTP aims to enhance Edge Hill's capacity to prepare graduates for employment and provide mutually beneficial activities that serve students' needs as well as those of the outdoor arts sector.



We don't have enough properly prepared graduates and emerging artists to service all our projects, so developing a partnership with Edge Hill University is also engaging with the higher education sector as part of long-term sustainability strategy.
